DPERATIONS & TRAINING: During this quarter the squadron conducted Precision Training for two weeks. Nineteen individuals were picked to participate in training aimed at upgrading them to the 5 skill level. These individuals received intensive upgrade training by means of On-The-Training. Results were the upgrading of 13 people to the 5 level in their AFSC. This training was conducted to improve UNITREP. Preparations were being made for the Squadron's participation in the up-coming NATO JCS Exercise of DISTANT DRUM and FLINTLOCK. One person was sent to Vaihingen, Germany augmenting HQs SOTFE staff planning, preparing for the NATO JCS Exercises. Another person was sent to Lindsey AS, Germany as Team Chief for ANG CADRE for the NATO Exercises.

Equipment performance is Satisfactory.

Building facelift is in the planning stages.

Manpower level is low due to separations of non-attenders.

Funds for the unit remain Satisfactory for meeting mission requirements. Special Training, Air Technician Travel and Per Diem.

OTHER SUBJECTS: The unit received the Tributary of the Year Award 1982. The second one for the unit. The unit received the award in 1981 also.

As a part of an operations & training exercise the unit conducted a Practice ORI during the April UTA. The practice ORI was conducted to evaluate the readiness capabilities of the unit. The results were enlightening and pointed out the week areas requiring addition training. On 11 April, 8 people departed for West Raynham, United Kingdom to participate in the NATO Exercise, FLINTLOCK. On 4 May the unit deployed personnel to Nea Makri, Greece, Torrejon, Spain, Gioia Del Colle, Italy Eskishir, Turkey and Incerlik, Turkey, to participate in the NATO JCS Exercise DISTANT DRUM. On 12 June, 3 people and selected equipment went to March AFB, CA to participate in the GLOBAL SHIELD Exercise.

Equipment performance was Satisfactory.

A facility change was initiated during the month of April and completed in June, the mobility equipment was moved to a new building to consolidate WRSK and warehouse supplies. The move to a new warehouse will greatly enhance our mobility capability.

Manning levels remain constant.

Funds for the unit remain Satisfactory for meeting mission requirements Special Training, Air Technician Travel and Per Diem.

Other subjects was the addition of a Disaster Prepareness NCO. Our Disaster Prepareness program will get a big lift from this addition.
