#### January-1992

UTA 4-5 January -- Designated 36-hour

Designed to provide maximum allowable time for realistic operations training. Maximum use of the lease land line to the 256 CCSQ for the 244 CCSQ was planned. Primary emphasis was on training operations shift personnel.

#### February-1992

1-2 February -- 8-hr. Operational Training

UTA was designated an 8-hour operational training period. A lease land line to the 256 CCSQ was terminated in the TGC-27 van Saturday and Sunday.
